



2014 ANNUAL REPORT TO THE COMMUNITY CELEBRATING 45 YEARS OF SERVICE!

It's been another year of growth and achievement at Boley Centers, with a few challenges thrown in along the way! We celebrated the grand opening of our Sunset Point Apartments in Clearwater with 14 units of permanent supported housing for individuals with mental illnesses and very low income. We proudly broke ground on Duval Park which will offer 88 units of housing for Veterans who have service-related disabilities and their families. We also had the honor of Congressman David Jolly's office providing a Veterans Day makeover at our Martin Lott facility where we provide room and board for Veterans who are receiving treatment from the VA for military-related trauma and its associated consequences.

Amidst our triumph, we continue to face the all too common challenges felt in the mental health arena – increased need, decreased funding and a growing recognition that adults with mental illnesses are being underserved, particularly in the State of Florida. Despite the challenge of accomplishing more with diminishing resources, we power on.

The testimony from **William** that is featured on the next page convinces us that there is great value to our work. We really *can* and *do* make a difference in the lives of the people we serve. For many of us it is hard to imagine what it would be like to be homeless or hopeless. How about both? The lives of the people we serve look vastly different from the lives most of us are fortunate enough to know. Struggles are relative, but when living with a mental illness adversity can become amplified, constant and harder to overcome. We assisted William in obtaining the *fundamental* needs of any human being - shelter, food and safety. As a result, his dignity has been restored and his independence regained.

Here are several other accounts of success and self-sufficiency we have seen this past year...

- Since coming to Boley Centers' FACT Team, **Jackie** has grown to be independent, active in her treatment, able to save money and proficient with the public transportation system to get to and from her job at Publix. She has worked there for more than two years and has received praise for her outstanding work. She helps her mother and daughter financially and is a volunteer at the Rays games. She is also a member of the YMCA and Vincent House.
- Last year **Quinton**, a consumer who receives Boley Centers' Supported Housing Services and lives in permanent supported housing, approached staff about attending a 65-day substance abuse program in Avon Park, FL. He researched the center on his own and completed all 65 days. Since graduating from the program, he has begun volunteering in the cafeteria at St. Vincent de Paul three days a week to keep busy, feel good about himself and give back to the community. He also attends AA meetings three times a week and works closely with his recovery specialist to review his treatment plan weekly. Quinton is on a positive path and staff are optimistic for his recovery.
- **Shanetta** lives in permanent supported housing and receives supported housing services. She works hard to help her peers and champions on their behalf through her role in the agency's Consumer Advisory Council. She lives independently, volunteers her time at Boley Centers' Annual Jingle Bell Run, has spoken at Boley Angels events and has been on the agency's Board of Directors since 2010. As a Board Member, she actively advocates for her peers and is able to take relevant information back to them to share. Shanetta has come a long way and is very proud of maintaining her own apartment.

Here's the truth though - we don't accomplish great things on our own; we do it as a team with the dedication of staff, our loyal Board of Directors, the effort of the men and women we serve and the support of the community. The year 2015 marks Boley Centers' 45th Anniversary and now more than ever we say to our supporters, *thank you!* We would not be the agency we are today without this great community behind us!

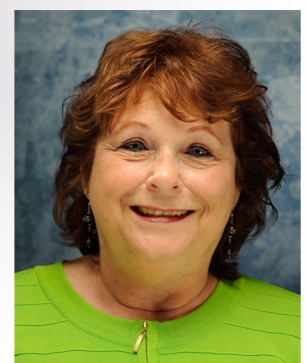

2013/2014 Community Benefit & Outreach

- Throughout the year, more than 2,800 people were served through Boley Centers programs and services including:
 - 794 people who were screened through Boley Centers' Homeless Outreach efforts, resulting in 129 who were taken off of the street and housed.
 - 523 Veterans who were screened through the HVRP program and either enrolled in the program or referred on for alternate services.
 - 228 adults who received employment services through Boley Centers' Supported Employment Program.
 - 135 young adults who participated in Boley Centers' Summer Youth Intern Program (SYIP), resulting in 17 interns who were permanently hired and 21 interns who went on to enroll in college.
- Provided 1,047 units of housing, with another 157 units in varying stages of development, including: 410 vouchers, 374 permanent housing units, 150 permanent homeless housing units, 45 group home beds, 43 Veteran beds and 25 Safe Haven beds.
- Boley Centers expanded its homeless services reach to families, serving 14 families and a total of 65 family members.
- Boley Centers' Seeking Safety Committee presented a Seeking Safety training at the Florida Alcohol & Drug Abuse Association Conference in Orlando.
- Three Boley staff members - Marcy MacMath, Kevin Marrone and Pat Robinson were presented with Iris Awards from the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI).
- Boley Centers' Life Enhancement Activities Program (LEAP) held a six-week smoking cessation program, resulting in a 35% decrease in smoking.
- Boley Centers' FACT Team continues to provide internship opportunities for mental health interns, resulting in improved consumer services and a number of interns who have gone on to become staff.
- Agency staff and consumers organized the 11th Annual William Doran Art Show which is held each year in memory of William Doran, a talented artist and consumer who passed away 12 years ago.
- Boley Centers served a Thanksgiving Feast to 350 consumers and their family members.
- The agency's Cultural Competency Committee hosted its 18th Annual Black History Celebration for consumers and staff. The Committee also organized a staff collection for food and delivered baskets to five needy families at Thanksgiving and six needy families at Christmas, including toys for the children.
- Boley Centers held its 32nd Annual Jingle Bell Run in downtown St. Petersburg, attracting more than 3,000 participants.

**"I was hopeless, homeless
and living at tent city."**

Dear Mr. MacMath,

My name is William. As of the date at the top of this letter (12/28/14), I have been a resident of Broadwater Apartments for four years. Before that I was at Safe Haven. I wish I was better with words so I could better express the gratitude I feel towards Boley and everyone in Boley. I was hopeless, homeless and "living" at tent city. That was definitely the lowest point of my life. Boley literally saved my life. I was actually contemplating suicide [while living] at tent city. I saw no hope for myself.

Sharon Nivens was the specific person who took me in to Boley. I call myself agnostic, although I was raised Roman Catholic. I don't know if there is a literal Heaven but if there is, Sharon and most everyone at Boley are going to go there. My recovery specialist, Lisa Price, also deserves special mention. She does not have an easy job dealing with me and all the others she has to try to help, but she does a superb job of helping us.

Again, I just wanted to write and tell you and everyone at Boley how sincerely grateful and thankful I feel toward Boley.

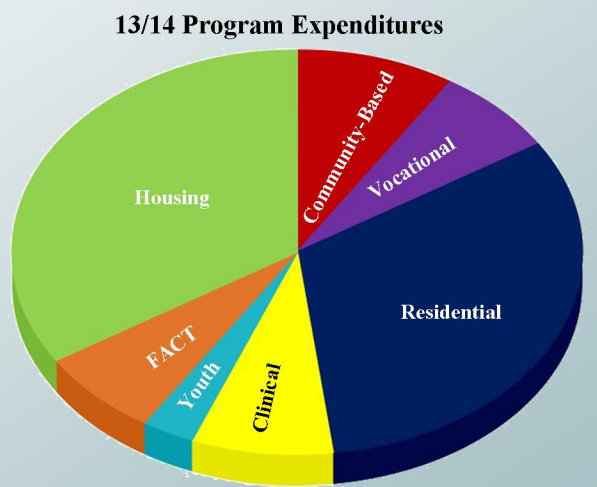
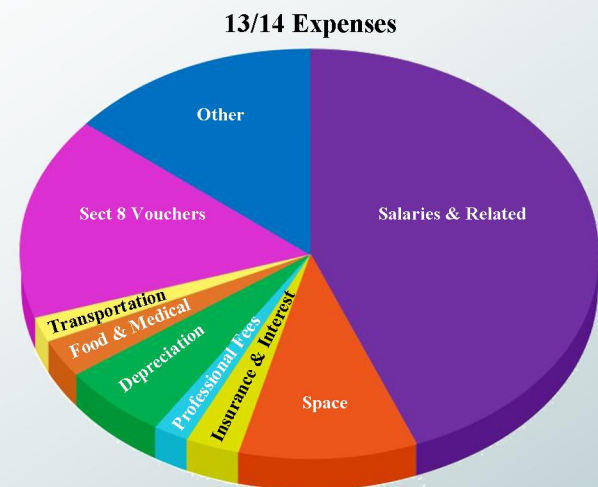
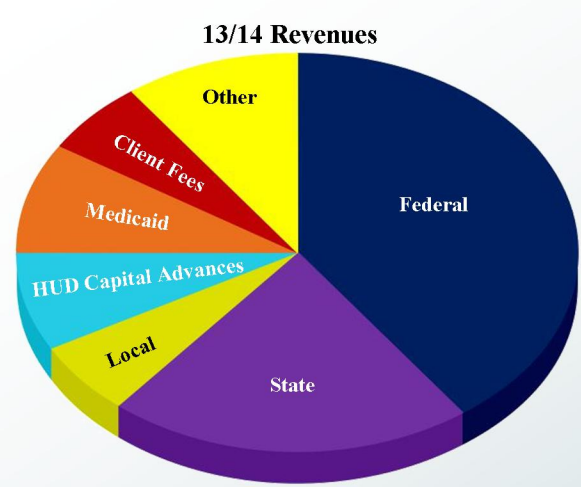
